
Lakshmi



Lakshmi is the Goddess of wealth, fortune and prosperity. Lakshmi symbolizes good luck. She is the wife of Vishnu/ Narayana. Lakshmi is goddess of abundance. She was born from the churning of the primordial ocean and she chose Vishnu as her consort. The word "Lakshmi" is derived from the Sanskrit word "Laksya", meaning "aim" or "goal".

Lakshmi is usually depicted as a beautiful goddess with golden complexion, with four hands, sitting or standing on a lotus and holding a lotus bud, which stands for beauty, purity, and fertility. Her four arms are symbolic of the four goals of humanity that are considered good in Hinduism - dharma (pursuit of ethical, moral life), artha (pursuit of wealth, means of life), kama (pursuit of love, emotional fulfillment) and moksha (pursuit of self-knowledge, liberation). The wealth flows from her hands suggesting that those who worship her will gain wealth.



The large lotus she sits on is symbolic of the seat of divine truth. The other lotuses are for fertility, beauty, purity, and spirituality

The cascade of coins shows wealth, which she is most known for
